

Suggestions for what a great real estate email signature needs to look professional and compliant:

Your full name

Use the name on your real estate license. That's the version your state recognizes, and it helps protect you from claims of misrepresentation.

Your brokerage name

This is required. You must clearly state your brokerage, no matter what state you're in. If your email mentions listings or market activity, the brokerage name needs to be there.

Your license number and disclosure

Depending on your state (California), you may be required to include your real estate license number in your email.

Many states also require a specific phrase like:

"Licensed to sell real estate in [List all your states you're licensed in]"

This clears up where you're legally allowed to do business and is often required in email, print, and digital marketing.

If you're not sure about your state's rules, check with your real estate commission, licensing board, or board of REALTORS®; they'll send you in the right direction.

Your title

If you're a REALTOR®, you must use the word in all caps with the ®. But only if you're a current NAR member. Otherwise, stick with "Real Estate Agent" or "Broker."

Your contact info

Keep it simple. One phone number, one email address, and a link to your website or listings page. That's enough.

Your city/state or market area

This helps clients know where you work and adds some local context, especially if you're working with referrals.

An Equal Housing Opportunity statement or logo

This isn't required in every state, but if you're linking to listings or promoting real estate services, it's a best practice. Plus, it shows you're paying attention to fair housing rules.
